






MAKING AN IMPACT THROUGH DISASTER SERVICES



Four years after Hurricane Florence, many are still struggling with housing instability. In Wilmington, Aaron Etheridge lost his home and struggled to find resources that would get him back inside. Damage from the storm caused his roof to collapse and rendered the house unlivable. While he searched for ways to get back into his home, he spent many nights in his car or at a friend's house. It was an uncomfortable situation made worse by the fact that his rebuild was outside the capabilities of nonprofits in the area.

"My house was destroyed, and I had heard about Catholic Charities from my nephew. And he explained to me that I could get help from them," Etheridge said. "And they didn't drop the ball on me."

With the help of Catholic Charities, Mr. Etheridge first applied for RebuildNC, a state funded program that provides assistance to repair, reconstruct, replace, or elevate a client home or reimburse them for completed repairs. Unfortunately, RebuildNC could not commit to replacing the house in a reasonable amount of time and the house would be condemned unless that commitment could be made by May 18th. Becca Ward, Disaster Case Manager at the Cape Fear office, shared "We heard that the county was going to condemn his house, and he's been a county employee for 30 years. So, when we heard about it, we felt that we had to do something."

After this initial setback, Catholic Charities turned to work with the County and the Disaster Recovery Act to get that commitment from the DRA if Mr. Etheridge completed a DRA application.

"We went through the process with him, helped him gather all the documentation, and helped him apply," Becca noted. They completed the application before the May 18th deadline and avoided condemnation of his home. The DRA committed to the rebuild, and Mr. Etheridge withdrew from RebuildNC.

Over 10 months, DRA rebuilt Mr. Etheridge's house. In addition, Catholic Charities, with the help of volunteers, cleared Mr. Etheridge's yard of debris and removed downed trees from the property.

Speaking on the day Mr. Etheridge received his key, Ward stated, "It feels great. I mean, we've spent hours on the phone with him, advocating for him, knowing this day was coming and trying to encourage him. So, it's a really good day to see him here at the end, moving back into his house."

"When I reached out to Catholic Charities, I wanted them to know the devastation I had, and not just me, but other people in Wilmington. I was looking for somebody to have an ear and understand my story. And they had an ear, and they listened to me."

Food insecurity is often accompanied by other issues which exacerbate the challenges individuals are facing. The Healthy Opportunities Pilot, or HOP for short, is a new holistic approach undertaken by the NC Department of Health and Human Services to address shortcomings in housing, food, transportation, and interpersonal safety and toxic stress. This program is designed to help struggling, high-needs Medicaid enrollees by providing non-medical interventions to improve health outcomes.

Many of the enrolled individuals have been referred to the Tar River Regional Office by Access East, the organization responsible for overseeing the HOP program in Eastern North Carolina. The Tar River office has specialized in responding to referrals for HOP food box deliveries. Once the Tar River office receives a referral, they will continue to deliver HOP food boxes to the individual's home for the duration of their enrollment, which typically lasts 3-6 months. In the past year, participation in the HOP program has helped the Tar River Office widen its food pantry program and service area, doubling the number of families assisted each month.

Liz McDowell, Regional Director of the Tar River Region, describes the impact of the opportunity on Catholic Charities, "It's given us the push to get into a bigger space because we're moving a lot more food, and because of HOP, we're also in more counties that are in our region." She further elaborates that it has allowed for the acquisition of freezers, which they did not have access to before. "We are putting out produce in more of our food boxes because of the increased refrigeration space. That helps families have access to fruits and vegetables that they might not have before."

The HOP program has also helped the Tar River Regional Office expand their Mobile Food Pantry operation. "Since we're making trips into different counties because of HOP, we started doing mobile pantries in those counties as well. We have two mobile pantry sites in Edgecombe County, one in Tarboro, and one in Rocky Mount. We also have a mobile site in Halifax and Northampton counties." McDowell added that the ability to expand assistance to areas with fewer resources is one of the program's benefits.

MAKING AN IMPACT THROUGH IMMIGRATION LEGAL SERVICES





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The Catholic Charities Immigration Legal Services Program helps individuals improve their immigration status and navigate the complicated network of processes and paperwork. In most cases, these individuals have already made many difficult decisions coming to the United States and feel overwhelmed by the immigration process. In addition, moving to a new country leaves many immigrants isolated and vulnerable.

Dilcia Martinez, a native of Honduras, came to Catholic Charities in March 2006, requesting information about the U-Visa process for victims of serious crimes. Martinez and her children were assaulted at gunpoint and terrorized in their Wilmington apartment. Fortunately, the youngest son was able to find neighbors who called the police to intervene.

Consuelo Kwée, Director of Immigration Legal Services explained, "Dilcia came seeking assistance with a U-Visa application that is granted to people who have been abuse victims and must help the police find the perpetrator."

Martinez then began gathering information, supporting documents, police records and statements of the crime. After several months of working with Dilcia, the 152-page package of forms, supporting documents, and fees were mailed to the United States Department of Citizenship and Immigration Services for consideration of her U-Visa application.

After several years of waiting, Martinez and her children had their U-Visa approved in August 2018. This meant that after two more years, they could apply to become permanent residents, and ultimately citizens of the United States. In the meantime, they received work permits, allowing Martinez to acquire a better paying job, and her driver's license.

When the day finally came that Martinez learned her citizenship test had been scheduled, she immediately got emotional, "I went to check the mail and saw that my test had been scheduled. I started to cry! I was so happy I cried. I immediately called Consuelo and then my teacher, Barbara, and they both congratulated me."

On an early Monday morning, Martinez, Kwée, and Barbara Grubb, a volunteer who assisted Martinez through the citizenship process, met in the parking lot at the US Citizenship and Immigration Services Office in Durham, NC. Martinez was up before 5 a.m. to make the two-hour drive from Wilmington and arrive early for her 8 a.m. appointment.

"Dilcia went through the U-Visa application process, then the legal permanent residency card process, and today has earned her citizenship. Typically, this is a 20-year process, so it is wonderful to see that she made it to the final stage." shared Kwée on the morning of the appointment that Martinez both passed her test and received her citizenship certificate.

Martinez noted that voting was a big reason behind her quest for citizenship, "In getting my citizenship, my goal was to vote. My oldest daughter has started to vote, and I wanted to see myself doing the same."

Through this long, arduous process, there have been roadblocks, setbacks, and most importantly paperwork. But through the combined efforts of Martinez and Catholic Charities staff and volunteers, Martinez has achieved her goal.

"Every time we come into the office, they are kind and attentive. And they always have the answers to your questions. I would recommend Catholic Charities to anyone looking for help, because their support is unconditional."

The 10th Annual Catholic Charities Gala was a resounding success. Speaking on Perkins' work, Trish Healy, who along with her husband, John, created the Ignite Award, said, "Mobile Food Pantries can begin to overcome organizational limitations. We can bring food to our neighbors, and it can serve as an example and give hope." She emphasized that these measures are a step forward in the continuing fight against food insecurity.

The evening's emcee, Ken Smith of WRAL, announced the winners of the premier Silent Auction item, a salmon fishing excursion to Nushagak River Adventures Lodge in Bristol Bay, Alaska. In a latenight twist, the owner of Nushagak River Adventures generously donated two additional fishing trips enabling the top three silent auction winners to travel to Alaska!











On Monday, August 16, 2021, Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Raleigh hosted the 4th Annual Drive Out Hunger Golf Outing. Participants were treated to great weather and a day of friendly competition. Rev. Monsignor David D. 

Gentry or Scottie Pearman, teeing off on a par five, helping the group get to the green in two shots, setting up the perfect opportunity for an eagle putt.




